REFLECTIONS FOR March 2024

Have you ever wondered what people are talking about when they say they're giving something up for Lent? Do you want to understand what Lent is and how it relates to Easter? Lent is the 40 days (not including Sundays) from Ash Wednesday to the Saturday before Easter. Lent is often described as a time of preparation and an opportunity to go deeper with God. This means that it's a time for personal reflection that prepares people's hearts and minds for Good Friday and Easter.

What Are the Key Days During Lent?

Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent. You may have noticed people with a smudged, black cross on their foreheads. Those are ashes from the Ash Wednesday service. The ashes symbolize our grief for the things we've done wrong and the resulting division of imperfect people from a perfect God. **Maundy Thursday** is the day before Good Friday. It commemorates the night before Jesus died, when He shared the Passover meal with His closest friends and followers. **Good Friday** is the day Christians remember Jesus' death. The "Good" reflects how Jesus' death was a sacrifice on our behalf so we can receive God's forgiveness for our wrongs, or sins.

Easter Sunday is the joyful celebration of Jesus rising from the dead to give us the opportunity of eternal life. While people still die, Jesus made the way for people to have a relationship with God in this life and to spend eternity with Him in heaven.

What Happens During Lent and Why?

The three main things people focus on during Lent are prayer, fasting (abstaining from something to reduce distractions and focus more on God) and giving, or charity. Prayer during Lent focuses on our need for God's forgiveness. It's also about repenting (turning away from our sins) and receiving God's mercy and love. Fasting, or giving something up, is a very common practice during Lent. The idea is that giving up something that's a regular part of life, like eating dessert or scrolling through Facebook, can be a reminder of Jesus' sacrifice. That time can also be replaced with more time connecting with God. Giving money or doing something good for others is a way to respond to God's grace, generosity and love. For example, some people spend time volunteering or donate money they would normally use to buy something, like their morning coffee. It's important to note that doing these things can never make us earn or deserve Jesus' sacrifice or a relationship with God. People are flawed and will never be good enough for a perfect God. Only Jesus has the power to rescue us from ourselves.

Jesus sacrificed Himself on Good Friday to bear the punishment for all our wrongdoings and offer us forgiveness. He was raised from the dead on Easter Sunday to give us an opportunity to have a relationship with God for eternity. Spending time during Lent praying, fasting and giving can make Jesus' sacrifice on Good Friday and His resurrection on Easter even more meaningful.

R. Conrad Douglas, 72, of Sioux City, IA, passed away January 27, 2024 at a hospital in Omaha, NE. A memorial service will be held Thursday, February 1st at 1:00 p.m. with a visitation one hour prior at Mayflower Congregational Church. Arrangements are under the direction of Waterbury Funeral

Conrad was born in Denver, CO to Franklin and Marjory (Rees) Douglas. He graduated in high school from Denver and continued his education. He received his undergraduate degree from the University of Chicago, master's degree from Northern Baptist, master's from Fuller Seminary, PhD from Claremont, and Doctorate from the University of Iowa. He was united in marriage to Lucinda Enander on June 7th, 1980. Conrad had a passion to help those in need; he was a very giving man who wanted to see a change in the world. He could be found protesting for a cause he believed in. He liked to keep up to date on the happenings of the world. He had a love for music, reading, activism and civil rights. Conrad practiced law for 26 years, consistently striving to help others. Conrad was a member of the Church of the Brethren, his strong faith was important to him, and he was always supportive of helping others on their journey. He enjoyed cooking, finding new local restaurants and coffee shops, playing chess and board games, hiking, and camping. He especially loved his dogs, having raised Boxers for most of his life

Those left to honor his memory include his wife Lucinda Douglas, children Colin A. Douglas (Lauren Moriva), Carl Douglas, Alina Douglas, and grandson Roland Douglas; sister, Sarah Miller (Vernon Miller); nephew Vernon A. Here's a picture of the installation of the cornerstone. As you can see, the building was actually built in 1923, but the congregation had their first service was held on June 22, 1924,

Here's a picture of the inside of the sanctuary. The original organ was placed in the center of the altar area and the organist was hidden from view by a screen.

Fun Fact

In 1895 a ton of coal was \$3.30 plus \$.70 for delivery. Coal was delivered once a month in the winter. Electric lights cost \$2.89 in January 1895.
